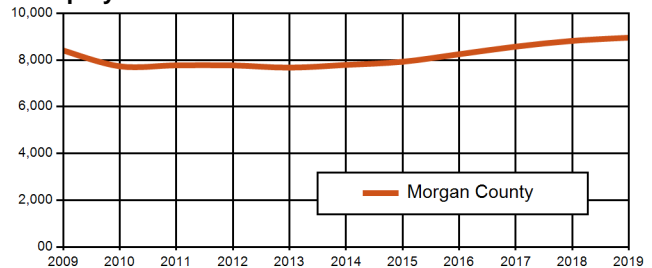

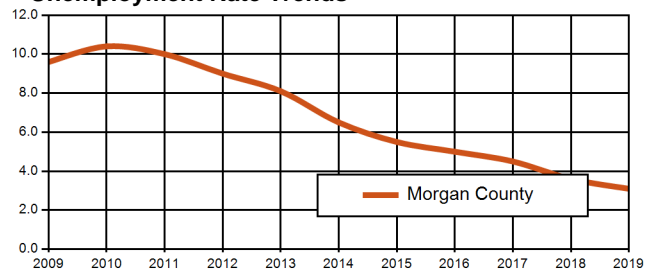

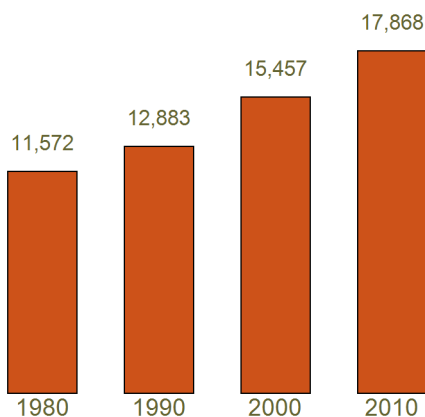

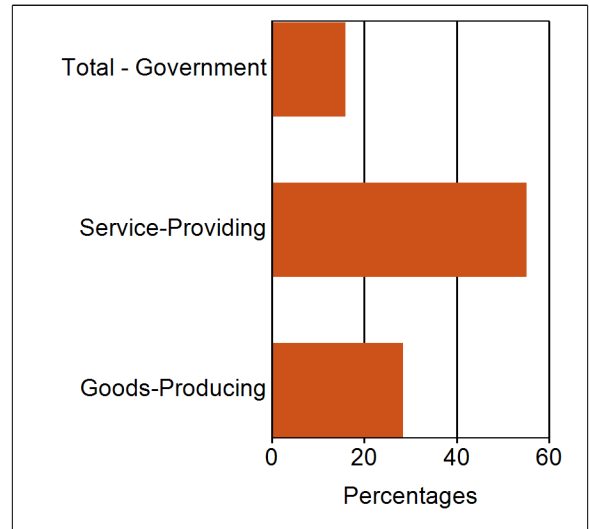
## Morgan Per Capita Income
